

Existence of Regulation




- Regulations exist don't let anyone tell you otherwise
- Growth in regulation has been substantial in past 10 years
- Regulation may be a part of approvals to operate

Conformance to Standards

- ISO 14001
- OHSAS 18001
- Company standards
- Codes of Practice



Increasing Complexity of Regulation



- Consider a regulatory tracking service
- Consider international audit protocols (ENSR, ENHESA)
- Consider local counsel

Basic Audit Considerations

- Be prepared...
- Hazardous waste –
 generation, disposal,
 and ultimate
 disposition
- Provisions of EIA or other impact assessment



Personal Audit Considerations

- Visas and transportation requirements
- Language barriers
- Dietary concerns
- Jet lag
- Distance between site and accommodations



Other Audit Considerations



- Difference between laws on the books and enforcement
- Requirements for environmental or industrial hygiene monitoring

Audit Follow-Up

- Beware the ubiquitous "yes"
- What is not measured is not managed
- Make sure you have support from above for reports at international sites
